Denies Council Unaware of Problem Cost of \$65,000 "Staggers" Group

"That is not so," hotly declared Stan Young of Whitby Township Council when confronted with an accusation last week that council lacked awareness of a basic water supply problem.

The scene was the monthly meeting of the Brooklin Ratepayers Association and a member of the association's water committee, E. Holwell, had just charged that council seemed "completely unaware" of possible treatment costs.

It would cost an estimated \$65,000 for treatment and iron removal from Brooklin's proposed water supply, Mort Mosser, another water committee member, earlier told the meeting. In giving a report on the water situation, he mentioned this figure, as supplied by W. T. Dempsey, consulting engineer. He said the Reeve and Township Council are trying to get a report on the engineer's survey and estimated costs for the complete water system.

"This has been in the engineer's hands for four years," declared Myron Vipond, a former member of Township council.

Mr. Young disagreed.

He said that council had asked for various reports from the engineer and this latest survey had been asked for only four weeks ago.

Mr. Don Wick asked what action came next.

For Approval

Mr. Young replied that matters then would go to the Municipal Board for approval and then to the Ontario Water Resources Commission for action.

Mr. Holwell said that a push was needed to get something done. He said that council seemed "staggered" by the \$65,000 figure. He added that at a meeting six weeks ago a resolution of council instructed that the Ratepayers Association water committee should meet with the Township water committee headed by M.O.H. Dr. J. H. McKinney to discuss matters fully.

This meeting has not as yet taken place, said Mr. Holwell.

Recently the Village of Pickering (which at the time had a population of approximately 1200) purchased their Hydro system at a cost of \$78,000.

The immediate result was a reduction of \$4.90 for the first 1000 kilowatt hours to each domestic user. A minimum of almost \$30.00 per year—a saving which is over and above repayment of the \$78,000 purchase price.

BROOKLIN TOO is a built-up area. Population last revised figure, 1572.

How can WE get a substantial reduction in OUR hydro rates?

The time is now ripe for this Township to set up a Public Utilities Commission and, under existing provincial legislation, such a commission has the right to negotiate with the Ontario Hydro to purchase a system in a built up area.
